We have sold about 500 of our books. Since we paid for our copies in October, each sale nets us \$17 on member purchases and \$19 from others. In addition, we received royalties of \$600 for books sold through other outlets. As mentioned before, we receive \$1.47 per book in royalties.

The Society received an award from the Illinois Historical Society for the book. It was presented during a lunch at the Executive Mansion in Springfield on April 26. Jerry Capps read about the awards and encouraged us to apply. I include a photograph on page 15. Mayor John Noak recognized us at the Village Board meeting on May 7 by presenting the award again for Romeoville residents to see.

On April 29 and 30, we had a display at Joliet Junior College, North Campus, for 2 hours each day. We also participated in U.S. Representative Lipinski's Senior Fair on May 12 from 10-12 in the morning at Giovan's Restaurant in Crest Hill. At both of these and the upcoming Canal Days, we highlight our activities and books, demonstrate some artifacts and invite everyone to visit the museum. At JJC and at the Canal Days, we can sell the books to interested readers.

Thanks go to the White Oak Library District for the bookcase and display case they gave us. Both of these are wood and are more attractive than the metal utility shelves they replaced as you can see from the pictures on page 15. Art Arellano and Joe Wojcik, and library Director Scott Pointon moved them from the old Crest Hill library to the museum.

Note that the next meeting is JUNE 11, not at the end of May as it normally is held. We will be planning the display for Canal Days and elect officers for the next year.
















