





This is Higgins School as it appeared in the 1980's when it was a private home owned by the Featherstones.











Competing in events that included armed and unarmed exhibitions, basic drills and color guard drills, the team from Ro-meoville High School took top overall honors

The Wheeling team, compris-ing students from all of District 214's high schools, took first place in armed exhibition.



And then, four months later, he was hoisting the Vince Lombardi trophy as an NFL champion.


