The Society held a successful Halloween event on Saturday Oct. 31. We advertised it as pre-Trick or Treat since we open at 1:00 and the Village Trick or Treat hours began at 3:00. Debbie Hassert and I, both in costumes, welcomed the costumed families and gave them tours and candy. Each tour was geared to the age of the children and included information on Halloween activities in the past. We included things such as nasty tricks, school parties, and bobbing for apples. I had stripped an ear of field corn and threw a handful into a metal tub to demonstrate throwing corn at windows in the 1950s. The event was so successful that we plan to repeat it in 2021.

In early November, Illinois returned to COVID's Phase 3, which shut down the museum again. When this happened, the officers decided to remain closed through the winter and reopen in March, rather than to open when the ban would be lifted, then close again. We continued to work in the building and were open by appointment for individuals who wished tours or to do research. The officers have replaced the monthly membership meetings with officers' meetings by telephone to keep the organization going.

I had several interesting visitors during the fall. One man from Indiana phoned to request information about a fire that occurred on the north side of the Village. I searched the files and found several that could answer his question. However, when he came and gave more details, I realized that none fitted the specifics. The fire was at night in the 1970s. All those in the files were during the day.

Another man wanted to learn about Romeoville. He had gotten a brochure at Isle a la Cache. As he was not from the area, his tour included more history of the area than we normally give. I talked about: the small town of Romeo east of the river and farming on the west side, the Hastert White Fence Farm and Hassert tree farm and the political connections of both families, Neil Murphy's Tavern and his 40 years as Mayor which included the start of Hampton Park. His tour lasted 2 hours, and he took notes throughout. He has been around the world visiting museums and told me about some of them. His next stop was Bolingbrook the same afternoon.

The Village expanded their Christmas decorations this year with a lighted display that filled the area in front of Village Hall. Families could stroll through or drive around it to see the different seasonal figures.

We had several requests from students wanting to do volunteer work for school requirements. The Bolingbrook Historical Commission asked us for copies of the records for schools in their area. Two girls have started working with me on the trunkful of forms from the 1-room schools. We were surprised to find ballots from School Board elections; they were small scraps of lined paper with a single name on each. These accompanied election report forms that often showed only 3-5 voters, including the 3 election judges.

Drdak Way

As you travel along portions of Spangler Avenue, you may notice a blue street sign that reads Drdak Way. This honor was bestowed upon a longtime family of the community that has spent countless hours volunteering, establishing organizations, and being active in Romeoville. The signs were presented to the family at the Village Board Meeting on August 19th, 2020

"Paul, Lilian, Robert, and Mildred Drdak, without a doubt, deserve this honor for all they have done and meant to our community," stated Mayor John Noak.

Paul was a coach, mentor, member of the Romeoville Jaycees, member and President of the Romeoville Golden Age Club, founding member of the Hampton Park Social Athletic Club and Romeoville Historical Society, and served as the Romeoville Village Clerk from May 1973 – October 1976.

Lillian volunteered in the schools, was a member and president of the Romeoville Golden Age Club, and a founding member of the Romeoville Historical Society.

Robert was a founding member and president of the Hampton Park Social Athletic Club, a member and president of the Romeoville Jaycees and Holy Name Society (now known as the Knights of Columbus), a founding member of the Romeoville Historical Society, and a coach for numerous sports teams. He volunteered for many committees, volunteered for the Founder's Day parade for years and helped with three census campaigns.

Mildred was a founding member of the Romeoville Historical Society, a member and president of both the Romeoville Jaycees and Romeoville Counsel of Catholic Women, a Girl Scout Leader, ran the Miss Romeoville pageant for years, volunteered with the school district, started reading and arts & crafts programs while working at the library, and was named the governor's Woman of the Year. She was born in Romeoville in 1927, but her family (Startz) had settled the area in 1896.



The honorary designation is through the Village of Romeoville's Commemorative Program, a unique opportunity for residents to honor a current or former community member and to recognize individuals that have made a significant contribution or impact on the community. 
As Abe Lincoln also said, UNITED WE STAND, ALL TOGETHER.




Reminiscences of "Old Romeoville"


